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Mission Statement

The Orange County Public Law Library is a state chartered comprehensive public library, the purpose of which is to provide reference materials and research services on state, federal and international statutes, case law and supporting materials to the general public and legal community of Orange County, California.

The library emphasizes the provision of quality levels of traditional service and technological alternatives to meet the present and projected needs of its patrons.

The library is dedicated to maintaining and improving the high standards of its services through its skilled and knowledgeable staff.

Major Events

In-person usage of the library was up slightly over last year and significantly higher than the average over the last seven years. *See* Exhibit B. Use of our research services went up, with a substantial jump to 6,275 in-person queries, the highest volume in years. The library's weekly Consumer Debt Workshop, offered in partnership with Community Legal Aid SoCal and Public Law Center, remained popular, and a monthly Consumer Warranty Workshop with Public Law Center was added.

Library staff continued to provide service beyond our building, responding to 195 questions submitted by email and 1,083 queries submitted through the Ask a Law Librarian service (https://calcountylawlib.libanswers.com/), a joint effort of the Council of California County Law Librarians and the California State Library to provide online legal research assistance state-wide. Staff also continued to develop online self-help guides and digitize existing guides (https://www.ocpll.org/legal-research-resources/).

The library increased its digital offerings by adding titles to the LexisNexis Digital Library e-book platform and adding Bloomberg Law, which integrates Bloomberg's news, business, and financial analytics with a comprehensive legal research platform including litigation analytics and dockets.

Budget

Operating revenue was \$3.7 million, 14% higher than anticipated and 9% higher than last year. Expenditures were \$2.6 million, 6% below budget. In addition, the library received \$90,527 in supplemental funding from the state legislature as part of an ongoing effort to offset revenue shortfalls caused by increases in filing fee waivers. *See* Exhibit A.

Expenditures were mostly on target, with some anomalies:

0104 Annual Leave Payoff: library employees may request payouts of accrued annual leave each fiscal year, up to 100 hours. The benefit was used more this year than previously.

0301 Unemployment Insurance: a misunderstanding lead to the library making an overpayment to the California Employment Development Department. The agency committed to returning the overage in fall 2025.

1402 Minor Alterations & Improvements: an allowance for unexpected building modification work, e.g., adding an electrical outlet or card access point. The library submitted more work orders this year than expected, in part to improve accessibility.

1800 Office Expense: There were substantial increases in the price of office supplies this year and the library had to replenish its stores of some library-specific materials. We took advantage of bulk savings but this lead to higher expenditures in this line than last year or likely next.

1802 Periodicals: Publishers' supplementation practices lead to higher expenditures on this line and lower expenditures on 2400 Books.

1911 CWCAP: the county's charge for accounting services and data system development. The final charge was slightly higher than initially estimated.

4000 Equipment: Inflation led to slight increases in material costs for the year's capital projects, especially furnishings.

Collection

The grand total of all volumes and volume equivalents held by the library is 387,012, a 0.4% increase in collection size over the previous year. The library spent \$657,126 for materials, a 6% increase over last year, as the library continues to grow its collection of online resources while balancing the demand for print resources.

Technical Services staff added 11,289 new bibliographic records to our online catalog system, along with 18,111 supporting records.
